2022-2023 Themes

Guided by God's Promises (Year 1, 2022-2023)

God makes promises to God's people and to all creation and is faithful in keeping those promises. In the first story in this year's lectionary, God promises not to destroy the earth by flood ever again. Continuing with the covenant with the Israelites, the promise of Jesus, and Paul's words that nothing can separate us from God, the narrative of Scripture follows God's promises and God's faithfulness to them. God keeps promises, even though we often struggle to respond faithfully. It is these promises that should guide our own lives and decisions as we trust fully in God. Faith in the promises of God give us the courage to work and speak for justice, to live in hope no matter the circumstances, and to share the good news of Jesus with all people.

God's Promises Bring Hope (Pentecost: Sept. 11 to Oct. 9, 2022)

God's promises bring hope for the future. After the flood, God promises God's loving relationship with all people. God promises Abram a future of descendants through which all the world will be blessed. God's presence brings Joseph hope even as he faces trials. Rescuing the Israelites, God promises to be their God, a central theme in the Old Testament. The gift of this covenant and the Ten Commandments provides the Israelites with guidelines on how to love God and love others in ways that bring life and hope to all.

Living Faithfully in God's Promise (Pentecost: Oct. 16 to Nov. 6, 2022)

Joshua and Solomon remember God's covenant and seek to serve God wisely. Living faithfully and trusting God creates opportunities to share God's power with others, as Elisha did in healing Naaman. Yet it can be a struggle to live in the ways God desires. David strays from God, making decisions that bring pain instead of life. Still, God is always faithful and offers forgiveness and love.

God's Plan for Peace (Pentecost: Nov. 13 to Nov. 20, 2022)

As we seek to live faithfully, God desires lives of justice and kindness. Though God's people have struggled, God has a plan for peace. In Micah, God promises more hope; a shepherd who will guide God's people and bring peace. As Hezekiah and Isaiah continue to trust in God's promises despite great opposition, they are reminded of God's future, a time when weapons will become farm equipment and all will know God's peace.

Faith in God's Promises (Advent: Nov. 27 to Dec. 18, 2022)

It can be difficult to trust in God's timing, especially when the wait is long, or a solution impossible. God does not forget our struggles, but instead renews the promises. God promises Habakkuk that redemption will come, though it may not be immediate. Esther is presented with an opportunity to trust God, and she saves her people. Perhaps, most importantly, God promises a savior. As the details of Jesus' birth unfold, God guides Joseph as he struggles to accept a plan that will reveal God's love to all people in Jesus. By trusting in God's promises and God's timing, we have opportunities to see God's faithfulness.

God's Promise of Jesus

(Christmas & Epiphany: Dec. 25, 2022 to Jan. 22, 2023)

God's promises are revealed through Jesus' birth. The shepherds discover that the promise of a savior is meant for everyone. In Jesus, God's promise to Abram comes true and the world is blessed through his descendent. John reminds people of the promise of Jesus, preparing the way, as Jesus' identity becomes clear in baptism.

Learning to Follow (Epiphany: Jan. 29 to Feb. 12, 2023)

Jesus instructs those listening to live in ways that glorify God and build up the kingdom. In the Sermon on the Mount, followers hear whom they are called to be as disciples of Jesus. Jesus' lessons on prayer teach us how to build our lives on the rock, guided by God's promises. Through Jesus' teaching, we learn what matters most to God, and how we are called to respond as disciples.

God's Power (Epiphany: Feb. 12, Transfiguration Sunday: Feb. 19, 2023)

As disciples, we remember that it is not up to us to do everything, but instead it is God's power at work in us that allows us to accomplish great things. Jesus teaches that things that seem small, like a mustard seed, can with God's power, become something great. In a moment of dazzling glory at the transfiguration, God reminds us to listen to Jesus and to be guided by his life and teachings.

The Ways of the Kingdom (Lent: Feb. 22 to Mar. 26, 2023)

Jesus teaches that in God's kingdom, things are different than we might expect. Sometimes, it even seems as though it is upside down when we hear that the last will be first and the first will be last, and the greatest in the kingdom are ones who serve others. In God's kingdom, mercy trumps fairness, and grace abounds. We are called to be extravagantly generous and relentlessly forgiving. Entrusted with gifts and grace, we learn to live out these kingdom ways, sharing God's love with others and using all that we have to bring glory to God.

God's Greatest Promise (Holy Week & Easter: Apr. 2 to Apr. 16, 2023)

Throughout Scripture, God has made and kept promises, but God's greatest promise was to send a savior. Jesus arrives in Jerusalem as a king on a donkey to the sound of great praise, an act that makes it even more clear that Jesus is the fulfillment of God's promise. As he cleanses the temple and clashes with the religious leaders, we see he is a very different kind of king. At his trial, the title of king is meant to mock him. Facing death, Jesus takes time to eat with his disciples, giving them the gift of communion and preparing them for what is to come. Still, it is hard for everyone to believe that God's plan was for Jesus to be crucified. All creation reacts to the death of the Son of God, as the earth shakes and the rocks split apart. Yet even after Jesus' death, God's promise to rescue still stands. As the disciples see the risen Christ, they are invited to let go of their fear and rejoice as they share in the good news that nothing can disrupt God's promise for salvation, not even Jesus dying on the cross.

Called to Share (Easter: Apr. 23 to May 7, 2023)

As the disciples begin to make sense of their life and calling after Jesus' resurrection, they discover that the gospel message is much larger than any had imagined. Peter learns that this good news is meant for everyone as he encounters a centurion shortly after a surprising vision. Paul and Barnabas are set apart for a specific mission to invite others, especially the Gentiles, to know God. As they travel, they remind those they write to and visit that all belong to Jesus. Paul encourages the believers to be unashamed of the gospel message, as they work together in partnership to share the good news.

Gifts of God's Grace (Easter: May 14 to May 28, 2023)

As we live in faith, believing the good news of Jesus' resurrection, we continue to receive gifts of God's grace, God's unconditional love. Even in facing struggles, we have peace and hope from knowing Jesus. Because of his death and resurrection, sin no longer rules in our lives, but instead, grace abounds. We celebrate that we have been given the gift of the Holy Spirit, who provides help and guidance. As we rejoice in this gift, we are reminded that we should live guided by God's promises, especially the promise that nothing can separate us from God's great love.
